Happily, we were able to do very well on all of them including the tiny Tufted Coquette, the critically endangered Trinidad Piping Guan, the spectacular Ruby Topaz Hummingbird and the incredibly odd Bearded Bellbird. But there were other important elements of this tour as well...

A big thing for all of us on this tour was to unwind a bit. Happily we were able to have some great beach time, especially in Tobago. We also explored some of the lovely natural pools at the Asa Wright Nature Center and of course we were all excited to try out Trinidad and Tobagos famous local Caribbean cuisine...which did not disappoint! Perhaps the best surprise of the entire trip and what would turn out to be a highlight for everyone was being privileged to witness an early nesting Leatherback Sea Turtle. I think we all agreed it was worth the early wake up call (3:45am) and at least for me, it will definitely remain a strong memory!

All in all I think the guests will agree we did very well on this trip. We nailed all of our targets, had some incredible and unexpected sightings, the ground agency we used was great throughout as were the hotels, and food. Tour Summary

February 12th (Day 1): Hacienda Jacana Grounds

As a quick introduction to our tour, we had a bit of time to explore the grounds of Hacienda Jacana. Here, the row of verbena bushes, scattered ponds and large fruiting trees gave us our first taste of some great birds, including a few of our targets. On the grounds we managed a few fun photographs of birds like; Tufted Coquette, Ruby Topaz Hummingbird, Purple Gallinule, Smooth-billed Ani, Spectacled Thrush, Copper-rumped Hummingbird, White-chested Emerald, Blue-chinned Sapphire, Black-throated Mango, Red-bellied Macaw, Lineated Woodpecker, Southern Lapwing, Rufous-tailed Jacamar, Streak-headed and Plain-brown Woodcreeper.



February 13th (Day 2): Hacienda Jacana Grounds to Outskirts of Nariva Swamp

Today we had a quick walk around the gardens before breakfast in order to see if we could photograph more of the same birds previously mentioned. It is worth mentioning that Hacienda Jacana has some absolutely 5-star service and operators. The food was delicious and they were super attentive to our needs and extremely catering ... not the "typical" vibe you get from the service industry in the Caribbean so 5-stars to them for that!

After a lovely meal, we met up with our local ground agent, driver and guide for our first outing of the trip. He took us around some of his local hotspots that skirted Nariva Swamp. A hot day definitely warranted the amazing beach side lunch and cold beverage and even though it was a bit warm throughout the day, we still managed some cool stuff to photograph. Highlights



included; Striped Cuckoo, Zone-tailed Hawk, Black-crested Antshrike, Pied Water Tyrant, Wattled Jacana, Silvered Antbird, Green Kingfisher, Bicolored Conebill, Gray-lined Hawk, Yellow Oriole and Yellow-chinned Spinetail. A fun ending to the day was a shoot with some Blue-and-yellow Macaws! The light was fading fast but we did our best with them.



February 14th (Day 3): Woodland/Waterloo to Deep South to West Coast/Caroni Swamp

Another early start to the day saw us driving around the farm and open country of the south and west coasts. We managed some fun stuff but ultimately the wildly hot and sunny conditions didn't lead to many photographic opportunities. Over the course of the morning we did manage White-headed Marsh Tyrant, Yellow-hooded Blackbird, Red-breasted Meadowlark, Scarlet Ibis (shot only by me out the window while our local guide was driving), Tricolored Munia and White-winged Swallow.



The afternoon was lovely. We spent the first half of our time in Caroni Swamp navigating the small fingers of this stunning habitat seeing things like; Green-breasted Mango, American Flamingo, Tropical Screech Owl, Masked Cardinal, Little Blue Heron, American Pygmy Kingfisher and unfortunately no photos but some quick views of Straight-billed Woodcreeper. The animal highlight was a sweet little Silky Anteater. This incredibly small creature only graced us with the puffy-ball version of itself but a very sweet animal to see. The main event of the afternoon was watching hundreds of Scarlet Ibis come in to their island roost while we had a lovely boat dinner and rum punch cocktail. On the way out of the swamp we had a quick spotlight view of a Common Potoo.

For two days and the morning of the 18th we explored the grounds of Asa Wright and the area of "the Northern Ranges". For the most part, the northern ranges didn't offer any great photos so we the vast majority of our great photos came from the grounds of Asa Wright. We had success with birds like; Violaceous Euphonia, Purple Honeycreeper, Long-billed Starthroat, Blue-chinned Sapphire, White-chested Emerald, Bay-headed Tanager, Oilbird, White-bearded and Goldenheaded Manakins, Barred Antshrike, Guinean, Green-backed and Collared Trogon, and the big target, the Bearded Bellbird.



February 18th (pm) (Day 7): Travel Grand Riviere Village & Beach

How lucky is that?!?!?! For the turtles comfort, we used a red light so there were no real photo opportunities (just cell phone) but for nearly 3hrs we watched as she finished digging her hole, laid her eggs, covered the hole and then with the sun starting to rise, return to the sea ... absolutely breathtaking and something none of us will ever forget!

The good luck continued for us when our main target, the critically endangered Trinidad Piping Guan made some spectacular appearances, both in flight and perched! We enjoyed some cracking views and pretty darn good photo opportunities of this rather large but somehow graceful turkey-like bird.

We had a long, long drive so we didn't stop for anything except a pretty spectacular display of fishing Magnificent Frigatebirds. We watched for about 10-minutes as these giant thieves scraped scrapes of fish off of the water. But again, as we were in a hurry, we continued on until we finally reached the airport.

Once we arrived at the airport, we were treated to a choice; wait three hours or, take the earlier flight to Tobago. After a quick call to our local guide in Tobago, we decided to hop on the early flight so after a quick meal in the airport, we boarded our flight and took off towards Tobago.

February 20th and 21st (Day 9): Main Ridge Forest Reserve/Beach/Little Tobago

Over our last two days, we spent the mornings in and around the Main Ridge Forest Reserve. Here we picked up our target forest birds like; Rufous-tailed Jacamar, Violaceaous Euphonia, Northern White-fringed Antbird, Blue-backed Manakin, Trinidad Motmot, Common Potoo, and Collared Trogon. We also made a great stop off at some hummingbird feeders where we had some great success with the White-tailed Sabrewing, one of the last big targets we were missing. The mornings were indeed productive! The afternoons however...

One of the afternoons we designated as a "beach afternoon". Honestly...this was amazing. We enjoyed some cocktails on a beautiful beach, the nice oceanside pool and each others company. This was originally built into the itinerary as the plan so we didn't feel like we missed anything by doing this and indeed based on our amazing results, we didn't miss anything we were wanting to target so we really did enjoy this. The last afternoon and what would be our last photo shoot of this tour was spent on Little Tobago Island. About 20 minutes away by boat, we enjoyed the spectacle of hundreds of Red-tailed Tropicbirds circling around us. We also enjoyed a stunning Ocellated Gecko on the hike up to the viewing area. This wonderful shooting session was a great way to end this wonderful trip with great friends.
