TROPICAL BIRDING Northern Colombia custom tour

10th - 18th February, 2022


This short gem of a tour has everything. Stunning landscapes, varied habitats, loads of endemics, great lodges, tasty food and friendly locals. No wonder it's become popular. The new lodge in the Santa Marta mountains has one of the most stunning locations, with panoramic views including the snow-capped mountains of the Sierra Nevada de Santa Marta and amazing coastline below. The sunsets there are simply breathtaking. On the tour we visited mangroves in the Isla Salamanca NP, dry forests and semi-desert at the base of the Guajira Peninsular, humid lowland forests near Tayrona, the foothills around the charming town of Minca and the endemic-filled montane forests of El Dorado reserve. Of course the Santa Marta endemics topped the bill, and we saw almost all the possible species including the Santa Marta Screech-Owl above. It was a thoroughly enjoyable trip with good company, great birds and a wonderful introduction to this magnificent country.

11 February - Barranquilla to Riohacha

The tour started with an early departure to the famous km 4 near Barranquilla. We set off in the dark and arrived just before dawn on this little side road. There were no major targets but a huge potential list of water and open country birds. One of our first stops was the edge of a reedbed where we saw Blue-winged Teal, Sora, Purple Gallinule, Limpkin & Wattled Jacana. A bit further on, a small pond next to the road had several shorebirds, including Black-necked Stilt, Least, Spotted & Solitary Sandpipers, Greater & Lesser Yellowlegs plus a surprise Wilson's Snipe flying by. We carried on, checking the various aquatic habitats, with Little Blue, Tricolored, Green & Striated Herons, Black-crowned Night-Heron & Glossy & Bare-faced Ibises. A perched Ringed Kingfisher scanned down for fish, and Snail Kites hunted for snails. In the scattered trees and bushes we also saw a ferocious-looking Ferruginous Pygmy-Owl, Russet-throated Puffbird, Spot-breasted Woodpecker poking its head out of a hole in a palm tree, the common and vocal Stripe-backed Wren, Black-crested Antshrike, Rufous-browed Peppershrike and Yellow-hooded Blackbird. We reached a viewpoint over a floodplain where we happily padded our lists with White-faced, Black-bellied & Fulvous Whistling-Ducks, the locally scarce Red-breasted Meadowlark, a White-winged Swallow flying low, Lesser Yellow-headed Vultures soaring above and an Osprey scanning for fish from its perch. In about an hour and a half here we had already seen 75 species. Not a bad start. A special bird in Colombia is the huge Northern Screamer and after returning to the highway, we spotted a pair just before the tollgate.

Next stop was Isla de Salamanca NP, a great site of mangroves and lagoons. The mangroves were not as productive as where we had been, but we still picked up some good species including Squirrel Cuckoo, Pied Puffbird, Red-rumped Woodpecker, Straight-billed Woodcreeper, Panama Flycatcher, Prothonotary & Yellow Warbler and Bicolored Conebill. On the edge of the ponds we found Whimbrel, American Pygmy Kingfisher, a pair of Yellow-chinned Spinetails feeding a chick, Pied Water-Tyrant and some Northern Waterthrushes. The star bird in the park is the rare Sapphire-belllied Hummingbird. I had come here yesterday to stake out some birds and seen it, but today it didn't want to show itself. One of the clients spotted a hummingbird very briefly but it went unidentified. We left the park and made our way along a narrow spit of land separating inland lagoons from the sea and here we saw countless Magnificent Frigatebirds and Brown Pelicans flying in long lines over the waves. We stopped by the entrance of Tayrona NP for a tasty lunch and from the balcony, added Greater Ani, Rufous-tailed Hummingbird, Amazon Kingfisher, Red-crowned Woodpecker, Social Flycatcher and Bicolored Wren. In the afternoon, we had some time around Gaviotas and added even more species, with Ruby-topaz Hummingbird, White-chinned Sapphire, Rufous-tailed Jacamar, several Lancetailed Manakins, Pale-eyed Pygmy-Tyrant, Yellow-breasted Flycatcher, Forest Elaenia and Red-legged Honeycreeper. The last birding of the day was on the way to our hotel in the town of Riohacha. We stopped near the village of Perico where I had a GPS point marked for Double-striped Thick-knee. We birded the roadside for a while but only heard the thick-knees in the distance. We did however see a flock of Bare-eyed Pigeons, a Roseate Spoonbill also in flight, Pearl Kite, American Kestrel, the stunning Vermilion Flycatcher and Fork-tailed Flycatcher. It had been a fantastic but long day of birding with over 120 species of birds.

12 February – Camarones to Finca Jorara

Before dawn, we met our local guide in the town of Camarones. He took us to some dry forest nearby where we enjoyed some fantastic birding. Almost immediately, we had a pair of Crested Bobwhites scurrying behind some bushes. We methodically checked off our targets one by one, with Red-billed Emerald, Shining-green Hummingbird, Rufous-tailed Jacamar, White-fringed Antwren, White-whiskered Spinetail, Pearly-vented Tody-Tyrant, Slender-billed & Pale-tipped Tyrannulets, Brown-crested Flycatcher, Scrub Greenlet and Yellow Oriole. One of our major targets was the bright red male Vermillion Cardinal, but we had to make do with the less colorful female. We got great views of the tiny Chestnut Piculet, the uncommon Black-backed Antshrike which wagged its tail as it vocalized, and the very localized Tocuyo Sparrow. The next site was one of the stranger stakeouts I have been to, the cemetery in the middle of town for Glaucous Tanager. We stood there just outside, playing the call and this dull blue bird dutifully flew in. Good thing it showed up, as a while later there was a large funeral right there and our activities might have been seen as somewhat insensitive. We drove on to our next site, picking up our first Reddish Egret on the way. Mar Azul is a small lodge on the beach with feeders and we spent a delightful hour photographing many of the birds we had only seen up until this point, but also a bunch of new stuff too.

Some of the many species we saw here included Buffy Hummingbird, Green-rumped Parrotlet, Straight-billed Woodcreeper, Tropical Gnatcatcher, Bicolored Wren, Tropical Mockingbird, Yellow Oriole, Pileated Finch, Black-faced Grassquit and Orinocan Saltator. After our wonderful time spent here, we thanked the friendly lady and drove out of town to a lake. It was absolutely crammed with waterbirds and we saw Blue-winged Teal, American Wigeon, Least & Pied-billed Grebes, Limpkin, Southern Lapwing, Wattled Jacana, Great & Little Blue Herons, White Ibis and even a White x Scarlet Ibis hybrid. Around the edges we saw Osprey, Black-collared Hawk, Belted Kingfisher, Vermilion Flycatcher and Gray Kingbird. The guide heard a Red-billed Scythebill calling from the forest nearby and we went in there and after some effort had good views of this outlandish bird. One last bird for the morning was the **Double-striped** Thick-knee which we had missed yesterday. The guide had a great stakeout for it though and we ended up seeing 5 of them. It had sure been a full morning of birding and we enjoyed a nice outdoor lunch at Boca Camarrones. Before saying goodbye to our wonderful local guide, we checked out the estuary together where we saw American Oystercatcher, Willet, many Laughing Gulls, Caspian, Common, Royal & Sandwich Terns & Black Skimmer. It was time to leave this interesting area and drive a couple of hours back along the coast to our lodge for the night, Finca la Jorará. It had been a pretty full on couple of days and the clients decided to take the rest of the afternoon off while I went to stake out some birds in the garden. After a delicious dinner we went to sleep to the atmospheric sound of Common Pauraques calling in the garden.

13 February – Finca Jorara to El Dorado Reserve


We had a short pre-breakfast stroll around the garden, picking up a few common birds like Ruddy Ground Dove, Redcrowned Woodpecker, Orange-chinned Parakeet, Pale-breasted Thrush, Crimson-backed Tanager and Trinidad Euphonia. After a nice breakfast on the balcony, we took a walk up the trail to a viewpoint which passed along the edge of the forest and gave a good view over the gardens below and large trees around the edge. On the walk, we added several new hummingbirds, including White-necked Jacobin, Long-billed Hermit, White-vented Plumeleteer and Whitechinned Sapphire, plus Rufous-tailed Jacamar, Lance-tailed Manakin, Streaked Flycatcher, Long-billed Gnatwren, Buffbreasted Wren and Orange-crowned Oriole. From the mirador, we were treated to an awesome view over the forest, sweeping down to the sea where we picked out some distant Royal Terns, Magnificent Frigatebirds and Brown Pelicans. White-collared Swifts soared overhead and we even had a colorful Blue Dacnis in the top of a tree nearby. We had arranged for a driver to pick us up at 10am and from there we drove a couple of hours to the town of Minca where we had lunch. Hotel Minca has very active hummingbird feeders, and from our balcony table we enjoyed non-stop White-necked Jacobins, White-vented Plumeleteers, Steely-vented & Rufous-tailed Hummingbirds while we ate. They also had fruit feeders which attracted the beautiful Whooping Motmot and Buff-throated Saltator while Plumbeous Kites soared overhead and our first Crested Oropendola appeared in the garden. We were on our way up to our lodge in the Santa Marta mountains which was the main focus of this trip. After lunch, we checked out a nice trail on the way up which was remarkably active for the early afternoon, and we added many new species, including Long-billed Starthroat, Scarlet-fronted Parakeets, White-bearded Manakins giving their loud wing snaps, Pale-eyed Pygmy-Tyrant, Boat-billed Flycatcher, Golden-winged Sparrow, Tennessee Warbler, Chestnut-capped Warbler and Streaked Saltator. The main target along here was the tricky Rosy Thrush-Tanager which I spotted working the leaf litter but it quickly disappeared.

Our very knowledgeable local driver also showed us a spot further up for our first endemic, the Santa Marta Antbird. The road this far had been cement, but we turned on to a very rough and rocky road from which point on, things got a lot slower. The driver took it very easy and it was not unpleasant. We walked a short stretch of road through forest, where we saw Golden-olive Woodpecker, White-necked Thrush, Black-and-white Warbler & the endemic White-lored Warbler before getting to the little village of Bellavista. Here lived an old couple who had planted lots of flowering bushes which attracted many hummingbirds including Lesser Violetear and Crowned Woodnymph plus White-sided Flowerpiercer. The endemic Santa Marta Blossomcrown was also sometimes found here but Dona Sofia said she hadn't seen it for a couple of days. We also say some beautiful birds on the fruit feeder, with **Blue-naped Chlorophonia**, the endemic race of Bay-headed Tanager and Santa Marta Brushfinch. Just before we left, she beckoned us urgently. The blossomcrown had returned. What a stroke of luck! We continued up the road and made it to the parking lot below the lodge from where we transferred to what I would probably call a 'motorbike-truck'. It had been raining a bit but stopped long enough to get ourselves and our bags safely the 600m up the trail to the lodge. This was new since my previous visit and it had one of the most stunning views of any lodge I have been to. The Sierra Nevada was up to the left with its snow-topped mountains, and down below we could see the land bridge across La Cienaga to Barranquilla. The restaurant was a circular building with glass panels all the way around. It was an absolutely stunning location. Our bags were taken to our rooms and we watched the Brown & Lesser Violetears and Crowned Woodnymphs on the hummingbird feeders and Black-capped Tanagers eating bananas while several Band-tailed Guans sat lazily in the low trees. The sunset took things to another level with beautiful peach hues reflecting off the sea below while a Collared Forest-Falcon have its melancholy call below. We had arrived. The clients were tired after a long day, but I ventured out and located a Santa Marta Screech-Owl which I hoped to show them tomorrow.

14 February – El Dorado Reserve

The Santa Marta endemics are found at different elevations. Today we were going in search of the upper ones at the highest altitude we would visit on the trip. A place that is known as Cuchilla de San Lorenzo. It meant leaving very early to get up there for dawn and catch the best early morning activity. It was cool when we arrived and the habitat very lush with trees full of bromeliads and other epiphytes. We started birding our way along the trail from where we had been dropped and started picking up endemics straightaway. We had Santa Marta Brushfinch, Rusty-headed Spinetail and Yellow-crowned Redstart as well as some non-endemics like White-throated Tyrannulet, Tyrian Metaltail and some very close Scaly-naped Parrots. One of the drivers suddenly came running up to tell us the Santa Marta Parakeets had been located. These had been scarce of late and not seen for a while. We rushed down to where all the other groups were gathered. There were some parakeets in a far tree but they dropped down and out of view. We had that sinking feeling. Luckily they reappeared right next to the road and we got to look at them close range and take photos to our heart's content. We thanked the driver that came to get us profusely before walking back up the road to continue our birding. We continued checking off more endemics one by one, with Brown-rumped Tapaculo, Streak-capped Spinetail, Hermit Wood-Wren and we even came across a mixed flock with Blue-capped Tanager, Black-cheeked Mountain Tanager and Plushcap. I only glimpsed the Sierra Nevada Antpitta, but most of the other targets we saw well.


As we walked back down to the vehicle, we gave Santa Marta Warbler one last try and it popped out obediently. All the other cars had left already and were heading lower down to where the Santa Marta Antpitta was being fed. Luckily they waited for us to arrive and we all walked in to the feeding site together. The local guide put down some worms, whistled a few times then stood back. We waited and waited, but no sign. While we waited, we watched Black Flowerpiercer, Lesser Violetear, Tyrian Metaltail and White-tailed Starfrontlet on the flowering bushes and a pair of Black-chested Jays up in the trees, but no antpitta. We moved to another spot and tried again, but with no luck. We were all starting to leave when the Santa Marta Antpitta finally showed up. Better late than never. We drove back down the hill then took the little motorbike truck back up to the lodge where we enjoyed a nice lunch. We reconvened in the afternoon for a stroll. We walked down the hill to the lower lodge and on the way saw a few nice birds like White-tipped Quetzal, Montane Woodcreeper, Montane Foliage-gleaner, Santa Marta Brushfinch, Tennessee Warbler, Blackburnian Warbler and Slate-throated Redstart. We spent some time at the lower feeders where we saw Brown & Lesser Violetears, Crowned Woodnymph and our best views so far of the Santa Marta endemic White-tailed Starfrontlet. In the beautiful gardens of the lower lodge, we also saw Band-tailed Guan, Golden-crowned Flycatcher, Blue-capped Tanager and Black Flowerpiercer. We walked back up to the lodge for dinner after our relaxing afternoon stroll. Due to a work commitment, the clients were not able to join me for owling but I popped down again to see the Santa Marta Screech-Owl and this time got a photo.

15 February – El Dorado Reserve

On our second full day at El Dorado, we were going to concentrate on the birding areas below the lodge and try and pick up some of the few endemics still remaining. After breakfast, we started birding our way down the trail and saw some lovely birds with Masked Trogon, Southern Emerald-Toucanet, Crimson-crested Woodpecker, Strong-billed Woodcreeper and Golden Grosbeak. At the lower lodge, we found our driver and asked him to come and pick us up lower down the road later in the morning. As we worked our way slowly down, we began to pick up more species like Long-billed Hermit, Montane Foliage-gleaner, the beautiful Golden-breasted Fruiteater, Cinnamon Flycatcher, Blackchested Jay, Gray-breasted Wood-Wren, Black-hooded Thrush, White-lored Warbler and Swallow Tanager. Our main target along this stretch was the endemic Santa Marta Tapaculo. I had been playing the tape as we walked along and finally I got a response. We walked closer and tried again, but the bird had gone quiet. I had a feeling it was still close by and I put the call on very softly and we saw some leaves twitching in the undergrowth. With a little more effort it hopped out and showed well which is not the usual case for tapaculos.

We continued and picked up a few more birds like Rusty-margined Flycatcher, Yellow-backed Oriole, Black-and-white & Tennessee Warblers. One of our final endemics was the Santa Marta Foliage-gleaner and the driver had put us onto a good spot close to the primary school that he had gone to as a kid. After quite a bit of trying, it finally responded in a steep creek but luckily it also came in close and showed well. We called it a morning and wet back up to the lodge for lunch. In the afternoon, we strolled down to the lower lodge again and on the way down saw Strong-billed Woodcreeper, Montane Foliage-gleaner, the tiny Black-throated Tody-Tyrant and White-lored Warbler. Down at the lodge we saw many of the same birds again but the beautiful endemic White-tailed Starfrontlet never seems to get old. The big surprise of the afternoon though was a large raptor soaring. We got a good look, and my first impression was that it was a Black-and-white Hawk-Eagle, a very scarce raptor indeed. My gut feeling had been correct and after a bit of checking, it only seemed to be the 3rd Ebird record for this site. Fantastic. After dinner, we finally all went down to look for the Santa Marta Screech-Owl together. It responded as usual, but today wouldn't come up the slope, which I thought strange. It soon became clear why when the larger Mottled Owl called. This was keeping the smaller endemic owl away. There is definitely a lesson to be learned here. Don't leave it until the last night.

16 February - El Dorado to Minca

We were sad to be leaving the amazing El Dorado lodge set in what must be in one of the most scenic locations in the world. We savored our last views before loading our bags into the quirky little 'bike-truck' and starting our walk down. We saw many of the same birds again on the way down but did add Orange-billed Nightingale-Thrush which was working the leaf litter on the forest floor. We had the driver take us down a little lower before we began our birding. He recommended the Palo Alto area to try for our last endemic, Santa Marta Woodstar. He even told us which branch it liked to perch on. We waited around, scanning the trees and keeping a special eye on the thin branch he had indicated. While we waited, we saw many White-collared Swifts soaring overhead and some Swallow Tanagers in the trees. We even added a couple of new raptors, with both Hook-billed & Double-toothed Kites. One of the clients spotted a small hummingbird, just a little to the side of the branches we were watching and I got on it just in time to see it was our hoped for Santa Marta Woodstar. It left quickly and was not to return. We continued on down towards Bellavista and on the way saw Crimson-crested Woodpecker, Slaty Antwren, Plain & Streaked Xenops, Cinnamon Flycatcher, Browncapped Vireo, Sierra Nevada Brushfinch, Blackburnian & White-lored Warblers and Slate-throated Redstart. We enjoyed some birds in Dona Sofia's garden with Lesser Violetear, Santa Marta Blossomcrown and Crowned Woodnymph on the flowering bushes plus Bay-headed Tanager and Blue-naped Chlorophonia on the fruit feeder, before lunch was served. It turned out that the driver's mother had fallen off her bike and cut her head, so we picked her up and took her straight down to Minca to get her checked out. Later in the afternoon, we went down to a nice track below town with good birds. It started a bit hot and slow, but things soon picked up. We found a nice fruiting tree where we were treated to good views of Ochre-bellied Flycatcher, Thick-billed Euphonia, Rose-breasted Grosbeak, Crimsonbacked Tanager and Blue Dacnis. Along the road we also had Scaled Pigeon, Long-billed Hermit, Blue-headed Parrot, Great Crested Flycatcher and Crested Oropendola. Strangely enough, the highlight of the afternoon was seeing the rather sombre-toned Rufous-and-white Wren which we had scope views of giving its beautiful melodic song.

17 February – Minca to Barranquilla

The last morning of the trip, we spent again birding above the town of Minca. It was a little quiet in the early morning but it soon warmed up and the birds became very active. Orange-chinned & Scarlet-fronted Parakeets were flying noisily around, Barred Antshrikes hopping around in the bushes and White-bearded Manakin snapping their wings. Some other nice birds included Pale-eyed Pygmy-Tyrant, Lesser Goldfinch, Golden-winged Sparrow, Baltimore Oriole and Yellow-bellied Seedeater. It was a good morning for raptors and we had King Vulture plus Broad-winged & Zonetailed Hawks. We continued down the trail and reached an area with bigger trees where we saw Keel-billed Toucan, Black-chested Jay, Plain-brown Woodcreeper, Ochre-bellied, Dusky-capped & Streaked Flycatchers and White-lined, Crimson-backed & Swallow Tanagers. On the way back up we saw a pair of Scaled Piculets which posed beautiful and made quite an impression. We walked back to the vehicle and the driver told us that the Finca on the other side of the road belonged to a friend of his and we would be allowed to bird that too. This habitat was better preserved with bigger trees and a few different species. We continued to add more birds, with a flyby of Blue Ground Doves, the tiny Stripethroated Hermit, both Roadside & Gray-lined Hawks, Crimson-crested Woodpecker, Golden-fronted Greenlet, Chestnut-capped Warbler, Blue-black Grosbeak, Gray-headed Tanager, Common Tody-Flycatcher, Streaked Saltator, Purple & Red-legged Honeycreepers, Crested Oropendola and American Redstart. It had been a full morning of birding and we had added a surprising number of new birds to the trip list.

After a final nice lunch at our hotel we set off back to Barranquilla. We didn't have any planned stops, but heading back over the Cienaga lagoons, I saw one filled with shore birds and we pulled over quickly. Here we quickly picked up 4 new trip birds which were Black-bellied Plover, Sanderling, Semipalmated and Western Sandpipers which took us over 300 species for the trip. There were plenty of other birds, with Solitary Sandpiper, Greater Yellowlegs, Willet, Laughing Gull, Royal Tern, Black Skimmer, Neotropic Cormorant, Brown Pelican and American Kestrel to name but a few. And that was it. Back to our comfortable hotel in the pleasant north side of the city and dinner in a swanky restaurant where we savored the delicious food and reminisced by working out our birds of the trip which were as follows.
